Introduction

Background

The process for the Greater Victoria Coalition to End Homelessness (GVCEH) Community Planning Day is grounded in collaborative social development practice. The intention of this practice is to build and deepen community relationships facilitating trust and ultimately resulting in Collective Impact. Collective Impact is the outcome of community coordination, collaboration and the partnerships necessary to address the complex social issue of homelessness. This practice will support the humans experiencing homelessness in our region to live healthy lives.

The Housing First Outcomes Map was initiated through a comprehensive community engagement process in 2016. In April 2017 a community engagement process resulted in the determination of nine priorities. It was determined that 3-5 priority areas would be a realistic number of outcomes for the 2019-2020 Community Plan. A consensus building process provided the members of the Working Groups the opportunity to engage in an in-depth dialogue. This allowed a thoughtful and intentional negotiation of priority outcomes. These discussions happened throughout the month of May at the regularly scheduled Working Group monthly meetings; May 14th, 15th and 22nd. Systems Improvement, Monitoring and Evaluation and Community Engagement and Communications Working Group members provided the leadership that resulted in the determination of the 5 Priority Outcome Areas. In addition, the Youth Task Force held an Implementation Planning Day, May 10 to determine youth prevention of homelessness priorities that will be included in this document.

5 Priority Outcome Areas

Support Services (SS)

- A. People experiencing homelessness quickly and equitably receive the support they need over the course of their journey;
- B. Support services have the mandate and capacity to deliver services.

Housing (HO)

A supply of accessible, appropriate, safe and person-centred housing is available.

Advocacy and Awareness (AA)

Communities and neighbourhoods are inclusive, empathetic, compassionate and welcoming of people experiencing homelessness; facilitated through advocacy and awareness and our collective experience of homelessness.

Prevention Support (PS)

People are prevented from becoming homeless.

Collaboration and Leadership (CL)

Leadership at all levels of community and government share a common sense of purpose; are effective, collaborative, supportive and inclusive.

Community Planning Day

These five outcomes provided the platform for planning at the Community Planning Day on June 5, 2019 through a collaborative process inclusive of all GVCEH Working Groups as well as broader community engagement. Representatives from organizations, government, and people with lived experience (PWLE) came together to review the outcome areas both reflecting on the current situation and hopes and plans for the future.

Caterpillars mean that the activities, programs, strategies, or initiatives have been measured.




Butterflies mean that the activities, programs, strategies, or initiatives are running successfully.



Looking to the Future: Suggested Activities, Programs, Strategies, Initiatives for Support Services

Coordinated Approach:

- More outreach workers with continued or increased coordination between support services
- Front line workers and service providers meet and develop actions around outcomes.

Housing Programs:

- Targeted outreach for people who have experienced homelessness and systematic barriers for a long time.
- Support/operating funds to support new housing projects (regional housing first program).
- Rent banks (stabilization).
- There needs to be an alternative to abstinence(?) base and low barrier housing.
- Home support services criteria needs to be expanded.
- Portable services to meet people in homes and help to support people with less than acute challenges (fewer barriers).

Support for Youth:

- Drivers training/licenses for youth with barriers
- More supportive housing for youth:
 - o Low barrier beds,
 - o Second stage beds for mental health
 - Overall housing.

People Centered Services:

- Focus on people-centred approaches to choice and human experience.
- Person centered planning. Shared assessment children's services model currently happening within MCFD and community partnering.
- Communication of entry 'into' system/service support access.
- Train frontline staff to support individuals.


Inclusive, Culturally Relevant Support Services:





Looking to the Future: Suggested Activities, Programs, Strategies, Initiatives for Housing

Increased Housing:

- Build more housing!! (x 4)
- Government invest more in land/properties (empty lots) instead of buying buildings. Revenue generated by increasing property values (equity). Land can then be leased to non-profits/service providers which can find funding to put building on the empty lots.
- Add to housing objective throughout the region.

Affordable Housing:

- Affordable Housing: Stop inflation. This is a money issues, rent caps, raise wages, but keep rent/food the same. Be persistent. This is something the government needs to do. Rules and fines. Capitalism. Bad.
- Community support welcoming the creation of new affordable and supportive housing options as a part of a diverse and inclusive and vibrant community.
- More affordable housing options for families with multiple kids.
- Consistent definition of affordability (not just subsidized/HILs, but below market as well) when municipal councils approve developments, ensure "affordable" housing relates to local income distribution.
- On-going rent subsidies that don't end.
- Higher rent subsidies, more rent subsidies.

Build Community:

- Incorporation of design in buildings that create opportunities of healthy community, belonging, and collaboration for tenants and staff. (Planners focus).
- Creative design and programming to build community in new builds (e.g. to support aging in place).

Focus on Diversity and Inclusion:

- FN housing with a support team to work though issues (i.e. eviction, prevention)
- Gendered lens to housing insecurity. A model that addresses barriers and help build capacity to address situations that led to house insecurity.
- Embracing new occupancy standards: tenants get input on what accessible occupancy standards for them.
- Focus senior's housingTargeted demographic, supportive housing: Youth, Seniors, Women
- More mixed-use housing (incoming, demographics, age, etc.)
- Pet friendly buildings





Supportive Housing:

- Supportive recovery housing, 2nd stage on the continuum
- Buildings set up for supports (e.g. operational funding, community space)
- Her way home housing. 24 hr supportive housing
- Wraparound supports as appropriate to work toward successful tenancy.
- Youth 11-26: Joint collaborative venture MCFD, H, Community partners, BCH, to create a hub of supports in housing:
 - Low barrier beds, emergency
 - o 2nd stage housing
 - o 2 buildings or split housing

Work with Developers and Landlords:

- Supportive programs for landlords
- Stronger incentives for developers to build more affordable housing.
- Develop a relationship with property management companies to advocate for a direct payment of disability funds (with bad credit) are possibly safer than that of working adults with no savings (4-6 week wait for E.I. funds)

Addictions Support:

- More managed alcohol and other drug housing options. Harm reduction oriented.
- More flexibility in alcohol use for tenants who are moderate users

Broader definitions for "addictions" (i.e. food addict, sex addict, gambling) to qualify for CASH, etc.

Scattered Sites:

- Less wait times for receiving advocacy. Less barriers. Understanding best practices around client needs.
- Engaging more with school systems around what supports are available.
- Subsidized bus services for those below the poverty line allowing for access to resources.
- MCFD liaison to advocate for youth aging out of care and inform them of resources available to them, thus creating awareness.
- Neighbourhood meetings educate about who the people are, services where the people can get stuff (food, clothing, medical services)



Make Rent Affordable:

- Support basic annual income as a prevention measure.
- Increase income supports so people can afford rent.
- Increase and have more rent supplements so people can rent in the market. Higher rent subsidies and ongoing subsidies.

Looking to the Future: Suggested Activities, Programs, Strategies, Initiatives for Collaboration and Leadership

Collaborate with Government:

- Education opportunities within levels of governing bodies and jurisdiction, that provide a joint foundation of understanding and shared purpose. Emphasis on our shared experience of homelessness.
- Involvement of government ministries beyond housing:
 - Social development and poverty reduction
 - Jobs and tourism
 - Corrections and justice
 - Health
 - Child and family development.
- Have government people actually listen to smaller programs and their ideas, have meetings and talk about what is needed to fix it. Be vocal!
 Don't hide problems from the public.

Collaborate with Other Organizations:

- Use existing funding to create partnerships and collaboration.
- Continue to build on collaboration between BCH, IH, and CRD.
- Cross pollination between agencies to focus on similarities and expertise.
- Focal point in very organization and agency responsible for implementing collective decisions.
- Leaders of organizations, politicians, academics, and their institutional leaders play a fundamental role in destigmatization efforts with respect to people experiencing homelessness.

Collaborate with Indigenous Community:

 Supporting indigenous leadership. Bringing together different indigenous communities and people to address unique needs and experiences of indigenous people. Based on the input that community has shared.

Collaborate with Community:

- Municipal Councils bringing together community to discuss and learn about the realities of being homeless and the benefits of providing local housing and supports.
- Bring "detractors" (e.g. community/neighbourhood associations) into contributing and leadership roles.

Collaborate with Front Line Workers and PWLE:

- Leadership to involve more PWLE. More people will listen.
- More front-line input at community table, committees, advisories, working groups.

Consider People Living with Trauma:

- Provide Leadership for advocacy for programs to prevent homelessness in youth in care, people with trauma (etc.) though early, early intervention.
- Trauma is a factor, yet money to social services is reduced. (e.g. Opioid crisis).





nelessness A Collaborative Outcome Framework

Support the Support Workers:

- Support system wellness to avoid burnout.
- Leadership at the organizational level to improve morale and support staff to reduce burnout. Trickle down positivity, higher pay and understanding the difficult, complex job and based on outcomes.

Focus on Youth Initiatives:

- Continue Youth Task Force.
- Driver's license sponsorship: a public-private partnership/Car Sponsorship for youth employment, to be perceived as a valued member of society, increased self-esteem.


Consider Funding:

- Funders ensure resources are directed to greatest need: Operation, support, prevention.
- Collaboration between government, funders, and community to assess current resources and assets.

Assess and Evaluate Programs and Progress:

- Deepening understanding of inter-relatedness of "root cause" issues and commitment to address together.
- Determine how we can improve, change, build capacity in a participatory way (i.e. individuals impacted contribute to determining the outcome).
- Determine how we can assess impact. We need to measure and do impact assessments for restricting and collaboration. Who is affected when we optimize programs (ie. CASH -> CAA).

Appendix 1: Discussion on Measurements

What is a measurement / evaluation?

People in Homes

- People are housed.
- What does successful housing look like?

Cyclical Homelessness

- Does cyclical homelessness indicate success? Or is it unsuccessful?
- Cyclical homelessness is a measurement of gaps and barriers that exist.
- How do we capture the cyclical person who is homeless? Make sure that we are tracking them through multiple services and times through services and not as a new participant. We are failing to capture this.

Formal Measurements

- Measurement happens with some programs at the 6- and 12-month marks.
- Both quantitative and qualitative data is important. We need the specifics and details of qualitative data and the richness of experience reflected in qualitative data. Mixed methods of research and assessment are best.
- It would be good to collect data and measure across programs and organizations, having the same mandate and pulling in the same direction would create a better system.
- Have indigenous people collect stories and data from indigenous PWLE because they will be more culturally sensitive and make the PWLE feel more comfortable and share more openly.

Identifying Those at Risk

- Measuring numbers of people who receive/do not receive housing.
- Action in program can identify those who are at risk that have not been identified before to receive support.

Measuring Success and Failure

- Need to measure and share both the successes and the failures because we can all learn from both, especially the failures.
- Trial and error, specifically for youth

Collaboration

- How many partnerships and collaborations have we identified?
- Networking between each other in community strengthens support services for those at risk
- Everyone know what services are available to better direct and assist people.

Supporting Staff

• Good staff moral.

Share the stories

- Collect and share the stories that are collected in evaluation and review
- People remember the stories more than the numbers. Stories give the numbers context.
